Safeguarding


Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility.

Our Curriculum

- KEY STAGE 3 ——

Our KS3 curriculum is broad and balanced. In Years 7 and 8, Driving Questions link the subjects together to ensure that students understand how concepts are inter-connected.

In Year 9 we have curriculum themes so that during the first three years, students are able to develop their STRIPE skills effectively to enhance their knowledge and understanding of the world around them.



KEY STAGE 4 —

At Key Stage 4, students begin to specialise, taking a combination of core subjects and optional courses leading to GCSE qualifications. Students choose from a wide range of GCSE subjects, allowing them to tailor their studies to their interests and career aspirations. Although students are highly competent learners and confident with their STRIPE skills, we continue to foster development in this area. This will be taught throughout their GCSE courses to ensure they are ready for the next stage of their education. Students are explicitly taught how to revise for their subjects so they are fully prepared for their examinations and have a greater awareness of how to succeed in their exams.



KEY STAGE 5 —

Our Key Stage 5 curriculum is designed to inspire and challenge students, providing them with the knowledge, skills, and experiences needed to succeed in their future academic and career endeavours. We are committed to supporting each student's individual growth and preparing them for the opportunities and challenges of the modern world. Students have a wide range of courses available to them to ensure they can succeed and thrive.

It is very simple. John Taylor Free School has the highest expectations of students in all aspects of life including behaviour, uniform, attendance and punctuality. We have a firm, but fair approach to student conduct at all times. These are the basic expectations for all students. Going above and beyond the expectations will be recognised via our reward system. Falling short of these expectations will lead to our behaviour management strategy being implemented.

Students have two questions to consider at JTFS

Does my behaviour allow me/others to succeed? Does my behaviour allow me/others to thrive?

PERSONAL TUTOR GROUPS

Every student will join a Personal Tutor group. Each group consist of up to 25 students from years 7-13. This vertical system enables mentoring and student leadership which supports all learners to achieve. The Personal Tutor is the main point of contact for students and parents and should be the first person you refer to with any questions about your child during their time at John Taylor Free School.

The Personal Tutor monitors attendance, punctuality and your child's progress throughout the year. During the first half term of Year 7, you will have the opportunity to meet with them to see how your child is settling in.

Personal Tutors are supported by Progress Leaders to ensure that students are able to succeed and thrive. The Progress team monitors attendance, progress against targets and attitudes to learning and will support you and your child throughout their journey at John Taylor Free School.

We report on their progress 6 times a year and this is available to view on Bromcom. Please see the website for details on how to log on and access details about your child.

There will be opportunities to see your child's work and understand how to support them with their progress throughout the year. However, if you have any concerns, you should talk to the Personal Tutor in the first instance.

Individual Needs

EVERY STUDENT IS AN INDIVIDUAL AND THEREFORE HAS DIFFERENT NEEDS.

Some students find learning more challenging than others. Some students need to be stretched or challenged even more. At John Taylor Free School, we provide an inclusive education where everyone can "succeed and thrive".

Mrs Bosworth is our SENDCO who oversees the needs of students who have additional needs. Students are assessed to support the identification of additional needs. Learning Support Assistant deployment (i.e. in-class support/withdrawal etc.) is dependent upon the needs of the student cohort.

We have arrangements in place to ensure that students are supported throughout their time at the Free School. This includes a clear approach to identifying and responding to SEND. We also have effective research led provision that improves the long-term outcomes for students.

We use our resources and expertise to:


• use their best endeavours to make sure that a student with SEND gets the support they need

It is Mrs Bosworth's responsibility to support students at key stages of transition, particularly those students who have EHC plans. We work with a range of professionals from education- and health-related organisations to ensure that key milestones are met and that the plans are reviewed every 12 months

NEEDS

Routines for Learning

MEALTIMES IN THE JTFS RESTAURANT

All students and staff eat together in the restaurant at lunchtime. No food or drink is to be taken out of this area or consumed anywhere else. There are a range of healthy options including wraps, jacket potato with fillings and a salad bar. A two course meal is also available every day. The restaurant operates a cashless payment system where accounts are accessed using a thumb scan of each student. Parents credit the account online via ParentPay. If you prefer not to use the thumb scan, we can provide a 4-digit passcode. Students who wish to bring a packed lunch must eat it in the restaurant or quad.

> Students have a 20 minute break in the morning and a 40 minute lunch break each day.



EQUIPMENT

Students should come to school prepared for learning every day. They must take care each evening to pack the correct items for the following day's timetable, as we do not have student lockers. It is suggested that your child has the following:

- A school bag of a moderate size
- Pens, pencils, eraser, coloured pencils etc.
- Pencil case

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- School dictionary and thesaurus
- Spanish language dictionary (recommended Oxford School Spanish Dictionary)
- Calculator and geometry set
- Reading book
- Refillable sports style water bottle

Parents are asked to ensure that all items of clothing and equipment are marked with their child's name.



TRANSPORT

Students may travel to school by public service bus, by cycling or walking. Cycle racks are available at school; students must ensure their bike is of a roadworthy condition with lights and a helmet must be worn whilst cycling. Students should dismount and walk with their bicycle when on the school premises. We advise students to bring an adequate lock to keep their bike secure. Please note the school cannot be held responsible for items brought onto site.

With all these options, we discourage parents from driving students to school. If this is essential, there is a pick up/drop off point opposite the school gate. Under no circumstances should parents park on Branston Road on the approach to the school or the local estate



ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Mobile phones should be switched off and kept out of sight at all times when students are on the school grounds. There may be occasions when a member of staff gives permission for students to use their phone but this will be to contribute to learning and in a supervised context.

Headphones may not be used unless directed by a member of staff in a lesson. If a device is used inappropriately, it will be confiscated and given to Mrs Plant. Parents will be expected to collect the item from school.

EXTENDED LEARNING

No extended learning will be set during the first 2 weeks of term. Thereafter, a range of extended learning opportunities will be offered and we will expect students to complete as directed.

Some of these will be challenges presented in the lesson to deepen or develop understanding, knowledge or skills. Other tasks may include preparing for a lesson, for example reading an article or creating a list of questions on a topic. Some activities will require work after school, either at home or in the Learning Resource Centre if appropriate.

Students are encouraged and rewarded for reading both fiction and non-fiction books in addition to their other learning challenges. Parents can support with this by talking about the books chosen and discussing the content with their child regularly.

All extended learning activities contribute to the lessons and therefore the development of the student in that subject. We welcome any support that parents are able to give students in their work. It is very important that parents talk to their child about their learning in school and what extended learning they have taken part in each week.

FOREST SCHOOL

At John Taylor Free School, we are fortunate to have a large, planted woodland on site where we deliver Forest School sessions. Our Forest School program offers a holistic approach to developing the whole student in a natural environment.

Students take part in a range of craft activities, woodland management, fire safety, cooking, nature observation, den building and responsible use of tools to develop STRIPE behaviours for the classroom and beyond. We have links with the Land Trust who engage with community wildlife projects on the land surrounding the school site, encouraging students to engage with wildlife and the wider community. Forest school is currently offered as an enrichment activity and as alternative provision for students who require further support to succeed and thrive at John Taylor Free School.



Enrichment Programme

An important part of education at John Taylor Free School is our enriched curriculum; a half termly enrichment programme with activities taking place both during and after school. Every student will take part in at least one activity per half term. Activities will rotate so that everyone has a chance to participate in a range of sessions. We like our students to try something new, be adventurous and persevere with a new challenge!

In addition to the formal programme of events, we also have concerts/performances, guest speakers, visits to places such as the theatre, Art Galleries, Museums, areas of interest and events such as the ski trip. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is another important element of the enrichment programme which sees students volunteer to support a worthy cause, develop their own understanding of both themselves and the wider world, and work together as a team to overcome a challenge in a new environment.



PE Kit

The school takes pride in the kit that the students wear; it provides a clear identity and ensures that there are no health and safety concerns. It is advised that students name their kit. No fashionable PE clothing should be worn. The school specific PE kit can be purchased from our school uniform suppliers.

COMPULSORY:

- School specific T-shirt in House colour (there are 2 versions available).
- School specific shorts in House colour.
- School specific tracksuit bottoms/plain black tracksuit bottoms. As per school trousers, these should not be 'skinny fit'.
- Black knee length socks.
- White ankle socks.
- Sports trainers (NOT fashion trainers, nonmarking sole).
- Shin pads and gum shields (for some contact sports school will advise when needed).
- Football boots (for football and rugby lessons).

OPTIONAL

- If your child is cold, they may wear a school specific PE jumper in House colour or school specific rugby shirt in House colour (worn over the top as a jumper or in place of a T-shirt), or their blazer. They can also wear plain black skins underneath their PE top.
- School specific rugby shorts with school logo.
- Plain black 'skins' or equivalent. •
- Students can wear plain black, leggings • beneath their shorts if they wish to. This is not instead of shorts and must be leggings - tights are not allowed due to hygiene reasons.





TIPS:

- Trainers should be suitable for PE and non-marking; fashion style trainers are not recommended.
- No jewellery should be worn and hair must be held back.
- All students must bring their kit regardless of whether they are ill or injured.
- Under Local Authority guidelines, all students must wear protective items for: Football - shin pads and appropriate footwear


Wellbeing & Parents as Partners
